


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




Monte Rei in the Eastern Algarve: Portugal's best-kept secret



Portugal – according to the country's Ministry of Culture – has seven wonders: The Ria Formosa Nature Park in the Eastern Algarve is one of them. An impressive archaic landscape of mud flats, salt flats, mussel fields and a great variety of flora and fauna. A chain of islands and peninsulas shields the lagoons from the open Atlantic. This natural wonder is just one of the many reasons the eastern side of Algarve from the Spanish border to Faro, is considered one of the hidden gems of Portugal. Relatively undiscovered in comparison to its neighbours in the west, the beaches that stretch for infinite miles are deserted and pristine, the waves are lighter, sea temperatures warmer and the local bars and restaurants that follow the coastline fiercely traditional.



In 2005, legendary course architect Jack Nicklaus was invited to build a course in this beautiful wild landscape at Monte Rei, and a legend of a golf resort was created. Acknowledged as the best golf course in Portugal with an appropriate 5 star plus resort experience to match it. Conveniently located just 45 minutes away from Faro airport this is the hidden gem of the Algarve. We will return to Monte Rei later but what else does the Eastern Algarve have to offer?

The temperate dry and sunny climate aside there is much to see and do; whether that be sightseeing and a cultural visit through the largest local town, Tavira (top tip - take a Tuk-Tuk, incredibly good value, saves time and undoubtedly easier on the feet), or a visit to the small village of Cacela Velha, which is impossibly perched on a cliff-top with far reaching and spectacular views of the harbours and out to sea. The absolute "must-do" here is try the local fresh oysters! Castro Marim should also be on your to-do-list, this historic walled village is steeped in history and, if you time your visit right, host amazing themed festivals dating back to medieval times.

If you are still feeling energetic then enjoy the spectacular countryside by hiking, cycling, bike or quad bike tour, alternatively, simply head to the beaches for kayaking, surfing or the everpopular stand-up paddle or just take a leisurely boat tour but make sure it includes a chance to spot Dolphins in their natural habitat, a truly spine-tingling experience.





It's an exciting time for foodies in the Algarve, with no less than 7 Michelin-starred restaurants and there is a culinary revival underway with talented young chefs creating modern twists to classic Portuguese dishes. There is an abundance of places to create that special night out. Tavira has an array of restaurants along the beautiful "Rio Gilão" offering a magnificent back drop to your riverside table. Feeling livelier then make your way to Cabanas de Tavira, this is a local fishing village by day, but by night the promenade is lined with restaurants and latenight bars. If fine dining is your thing, then Vistas by Rui Silvestre awarded a Michelin star in 2019, is Monte Rei's crown jewel; fresh, locallysourced ingredients used to create gastronomic delights, a welcoming ambience, uncompromising levels of service and stunning views over rolling hills, to the Atlantic Ocean.





Monte Rei

The premier place to stay in the eastern Algarve, is Monte Rei Golf & Country Club, one of Portugal's most exclusive estates, it's only 45 minutes away from Faro airport. There is a range of accommodation options on resort, superb leisure facilities and of course Portugal's highest rated golf course. Golf

Golf in the region

There are other nearby courses which provide a great variation including Quinta da Ria and Quinta da Cima courses, both very different. Ria is a shorter resort course with tremendous sea views and Cima is a championship style parkland course. Also, Quinta do Vale is worth a visit, a Severiano Ballesteros design, which is challenging with a number of water features on the front nine transpiring into an undulating and varying style back nine.

We hope you have enjoyed reading about the hidden gem that is the eastern Algarve and the Monte Rei resort. If you're looking for a great holiday destination that combines luxury accommodation, some great golf courses with nature and culture then Monte Rei and the eastern Algarve is for you.






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Namibia, a harsh but beautiful wilderness - Part 3



We come back to the third and final part of my journey through Namibia;



Serra Cafema

The flight from Doro Nawas to the Hartmann Valley took a little over an hour and flew over some of the most barren and mountainous areas I'd ever seen in southern Africa. As the Cesna made its approach to the landing strip, it appeared that the desert was swaying, most odd. Having disembarked what was swaying became clear – it was the desert grasses. It had rained a week or two earlier which had caused a spurt of growth that had become bleached by the sun and was now the same colour as the desert and was being stirred by a gentle breeze... quite a sight.



The journey to our lodge, Serra Cafema, took an hour and a half during which time the full majesty of the mountains, after which our lodge was named, showed their full range of colours in the midday sun. The landscape we were entering is vast, desolate and awe inspiring in equal measure but as we crested a small ridge the River Kunene, and the riverine strip of woodland in which Serra Cafema sits, come into view.

The camp nestles on the very edge of the river and sits perfectly, almost hidden in the landscape. In line with one of Wilderness Safaris' core principles, that of community, the lodge the land sits on, and over which its guests traverse is leased from the local nomadic Himba people, a perfect symbiotic relationship.

Our individual suite was spacious, rustic, and yet luxurious and apart from the gentle gurgle of some nearby small rapids was beautifully peaceful. We had two nights here and plenty to see and do. Our evening activity was a boat ride upriver with a sunset G&T on the Angolan side of the river – passports not required. The cliffs on the Angolan side are home to troops of baboon, with their young particularly inquisitive as to what we were. Crocodiles basked on the sand bars taking in the final rays of the day.

Our evening meal was a delicious open-air braai with the full moon reflected in the Kunene River – totally perfect. It was spoilt only by none of the guests being able to remember who originally sung Ol' Man River! There's no Wi-Fi here and the place is better for it.

The next day the lodge had arranged for a visit to a local group of Himbas. First though we had to master our transport – quad bikes to us Brits, ATV's to our American cousins. Unlike those we rode at Little Kulala, these ones had gears and took more getting used to. Our guide gave us expert tuition and after half an hour of easy riding near camp, kitted out with helmets and riding gloves, five intrepid bikers and our guide set out for the Himba 'village'; really a small collection of huts. The journey was eventful with most of us getting stuck in deep sand and/or falling off. It's great fun.

We spent about an hour with the Himba understanding their culture - the women cover themselves in red ochre and mud when they reach puberty and don't wash again - and how they survive in such a harsh environment, truly incredible people.

We sat by the pool for the rest of the day, before a short drive to a viewing point for the obligatory, and much loved sundowner. With no light pollution and endless landscapes, sunsets have to be seen to be believed.

Serra Cafema is the most amazing lodge, in a special setting and has to be one of my top three lodges in Africa – and I've been to few. We left for the flight back to Doro Nawas with a tear in our eyes and lots of memories.



Okonjima

The drive to Okonjima via Khorikas and Ojtiwarongo took about six hours but just the first hour was on gravel roads, before a strip of smooth beautiful tarmac came into view. Bliss.


Okonjima is home to the Africat Foundation, a charity started in the early 1990's to look after orphaned and injured big cats such as cheetahs, leopards and lions. Over the years its focus has widened and now includes brown and spotted hyena as well as wild dogs and it also runs research and educational programmes. Its website https://africat.org is well worth a few minutes of your time.

We only had a one night stay in their luxurious Bush Camp – one of five accommodation options – but had two superb game viewing experiences, one tracking a group of three young cheetah brothers on foot through the bush as they hunted, getting as close as 30ms from them, which was closer than they got to their target prey! And another, in a vehicle this time, with a female leopard called Electra, as she patiently sat in a tree above a warthog burrow.

Guests can also visit the Africat Foundation and see for themselves the great work they do to protect the big predators both now by their veterinary work and protection efforts, and in the future through education.

The drive back to Windhoek took longer than we had allowed for; OK, hands up we actually slept in! And my plan to visit the golf course at Windhoek Country Club alas came to nothing.

Namibia had proved itself to be an amazing country, and whether you fly from location to location, or do as we did, you'll have an experience that will last long in your memory.







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
